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### ***Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic***

"Balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic" is issued by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. The legislative basis for the balance of payments are the Law of the Kyrgyz Republic as of July 29, 1997 No. 59 "On the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic" and the Resolution of the Government of the Kyrgyz Republic as of November 3, 2000 No. 645 "On measures to improve statistics of the balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic". This document reflects last tendencies in external sector development and shows statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and international investment position, as well as construction methods of balance of payments and informational database. This document is published 4 times a year - in January, May, July and October and has 3 language versions: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

**Last day for update of data for the present publication is July 20, 2015.**

- is set between years or months (e.g., 1994-1996 or January-June) and means, that all years and months are covered by the shown dates.

In regard with the possible changes in accounting methods or historical data, which are used in the given document, correction of earlier published data is acceptable. Therefore, 10 years period can be accounted as "open period".

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## **Other publications of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic**

This document is an overall report of the National Bank for the last year. It includes summary on economic development of the republic and monetary policy, as well as the National Bank financial statements, general information and statistical reviews. ### ***Report on Stability of the Financial Sector of the Kyrgyz Republic***

The report reflects the NBKR's evaluation of foreign and domestic economic factors influencing the financial stability, the conditions of banks and other financial intermediate institutions, as well as the analysis of the current state of affairs in the financial markets and the stability of financial sector of Kyrgyzstan. It is published twice a year in Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

### ***Statutory Acts of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic***

The purpose of the document is to publish statutory acts of the National Bank in order to provide commercial banks and public with statutory acts and official information on the National Bank activity, as well as propaganda of the Kyrgyz Republic banking legislation. Presumable publication frequency is once a month in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

### ***Press-Release of the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic***

"Press-release of the National Bank" describes current events, which take place in National Bank and provides with the major data on the financial market. It is published weekly in Kyrgyz and Russian languages.

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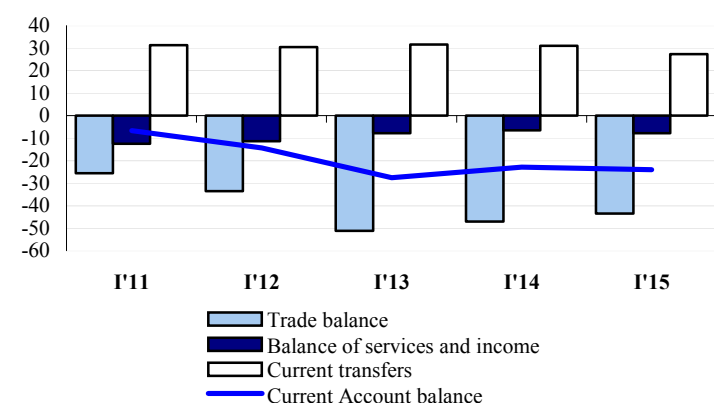
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## THE CURRENT STATUS OF THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

**Chart 1. Current account**

(In percent to GDP)



In the first quarter of 2015, the trade balance state was improved against the background of an increase in export of precious metals and a decrease in the import of ground transport vehicles. This served as a main basis for decrease in deficit of the current account position down to 24.0 percent to GDP.

According to the National Bank estimates, deficit of the current account position with regard to the NBKR additional estimates<sup>1</sup> amounted to USD 177.8 million (16.9 percent to GDP)<sup>2</sup>.

### TRADE BALANCE

*In the first quarter of 2015, there was a decrease in deficit of the trade balance conditioned by a decrease in import against an increase in export.*

In the first quarter of 2015, **the trade balance** of the Kyrgyz Republic decreased by 34.1 percent against the comparable indicator of 2014 to form negative balance in the amount of USD 385.3 million.

**External trade turnover** in FOB prices decreased by 9.7 percent in the reporting period and made USD 1,307.9 million.

**Export of goods excluding additional estimates** in FOB prices increased by 10.0 percent against the first quarter of 2014 to make USD 387.1 million.

**Export of goods in FOB prices including NSC additional estimates** increased by 6.9 percent compared to the indicator of the first three month of 2014 and amounted to USD 461.3 million (26.1 percent to GDP).

To the utmost, the overall increase in the export of goods in value terms was influenced by an increase in gold supplies. In the reporting period, **export excluding gold**<sup>3</sup> decreased by 28.5 percent against the comparable indicator of the first quarter of 2014 to make USD 131.0 million. Moreover, a decrease in supplies of main re-exported goods was observed in such groups as: "iron and steel" as well as "aircraft and associated equipment". **Export excluding gold and re-export**<sup>4</sup> decreased by 23.7 percent and amounted to USD 110.3 million. In terms of major exported goods, a significant decrease in export of vegetables, articles of apparel and clothing accessories was observed.

In the reporting period, the export structure according to the SITC items changed due to an increase in the export of major commodity items. Due to an increase in the export of gold, the specific weight of "goods and transactions not included into other SITC Categories" Item increased by 18.3 percentage points and made up 66.2 percent. A decrease in export of iron and steel as well as rubber tyres influenced a decrease in specific weight of "Industrial Goods classified by Type of Material" Item from 9.9 percent to 3.0 percent. The specific weight of "Miscellaneous manufactured articles" Item decreased from 7.8 to 4.2 percent due to a decrease in supplies of articles of apparels and clothing accessories. In the first quarter of 2015, the share of the other groups of goods did not significantly change against the comparable indicators of previous year.

For the reporting period, the primary specific weight in the sectorial structure of the Kyrgyz Republic export fell under the products of **processing industry** (metallurgical, textile and garment industry) and **agriculture**.

In January to March 2015, the overall production of **metallurgical products** increased by 55.1<sup>5</sup> percent that was conditioned by an increase in production of precious metals. This factor influenced an increase in gold export; its overall export came up by 52.0 percent against the comparable indicator of the first quarter of previous year. The growth was due to the 58.4 percent increase in physical volume of gold export against the 4.1 percent<sup>6</sup> decrease in average contractual prices. At the same time, a decrease in supplies of iron and steel was observed mainly due to a decrease in physical volumes. The other commodity items of metallurgical industry changed insignificantly compared to the previous year indicators.

In January to March 2015, there was observed a decrease in production of **textile and apparel industry**<sup>7</sup> compared to the period from January to March of the previous year; the decrease was also conditioned by low consumer demand in the main partner countries. This predetermined the 42.3 percent decrease in export of articles of apparels and clothing accessories in the reporting period. In absolute terms, the supplies of this group decreased by USD 7.9 million to make 10.8 million USD.

The decrease in total value of export was recorded for all commodity groups of "articles of apparels and closing accessories." In this context, the largest decline occurred in "articles of textiles fabrics for women and girls" item (42.8 per cent or USD 5.9 million).

In January to March 2015, the real growth of **agricultural production** amounted to 1.6 percent<sup>8</sup> that was mainly conditioned by an increase in production of livestock industry. Despite this fact, the reporting period showed a significant decrease in the supplies of meat and meat products (by 78.7 percent or 1.5 million USD) and live animals (18.7 percent or USD 0.4 million).

A decrease in export cost of crop products was observed in supplies of vegetables (by 41.7 percent or USD 9.4 million) and cotton (by 21.1 percent or USD 1.7 million). At the same time, a slight increase in export of fruits and nuts (by 21.4 percent or USD 1.0 million) provided by growth of contractual prices was marked.

In the reporting quarter of 2015, the specific weight of registered **re-export**<sup>9</sup> in total export decreased from 11.0 to 5.3 percent and amounted to USD 20.7 million. The structure of the re-exported goods showed a significant decrease in the export of iron and steel (80.5 percent or USD 3.8 million) as well as of the group of "aircraft and associated equipment" (80.1 percent or USD 3.7 million).

**Geographical distribution** of export shows any significant changes in the reporting period.

Domestic goods were supplied to 75 countries (in January to March 2014 such goods were exported to 69 countries) with the major share of export (47.6 percent) to Switzerland. The increase in export of gold to Switzerland had an impact on the increase of its share in the total export of gold from 36.8 percent to 71.6 percent. Due to an increase in the supplies of a number of consumer goods, the EEU share decreased from 26.6 percent to 17.4 percent in the reporting period.

The share of non-CIS countries in total export reached 76.9 percent (except for gold, the share of non-CIS countries accounted for 10.7 percent). Besides precious metals, food products (vegetables, fruits and nuts) were mainly exported to foreign countries. The main trade partner was Turkey, whose share in the export of goods reached 45.2 and 28.7 percent respectively.

In the reporting period, due to a significant decrease in the supply of goods of the "machinery and transport equipment" group, the largest share in the goods structure of import was observed for the "mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials" group. Specific weight of this group increased by 7.6 percentage points in the first quarter of this year to make 27.3 percent (USD 249.8 million in value terms). Petroleum products have a predominant share in this group.

During the reporting period there was the 4.1 percent decrease in the total value of import of petroleum products. Such decrease was due to the 28.7 percent decrease in the average contractual prices against the 34.4 percent increase in the volume of import against the comparable figures for January to March 2014. The aviation and diesel fuel made main input to the decrease of import as their import in the aggregate decreased by USD 20.1 million in absolute terms. At the same time, the supplies of fuel oil and motor gasoline increased (by USD 16.2 million in total).

In addition to fuel and lubricants, natural gas and coal occupy a significant share in this group. Natural gas supply came down by 21.8 percent in the reporting quarter (USD 5.1 million), while coal supply increased by 35.0 percent (USD 2.8 million).

As a result of changes in the conditions of import and customs clearance, import of used cars decreased by 95.3 percent, or USD 66.5 million, in the first quarter. Such decrease in import of used cars caused a decrease in the share of the "machinery and transport equipment" group in the **goods structure** of import from 24.7 down to 18.0 percent. At the same time, the total value of import of that group's goods decreased by 39.5 percent to make USD 164.7 million<sup>10</sup>. There was also observed a decrease in import of such items as "electrical apparatus for line telephony or line telegraphy", "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport of persons", and "parts and accessories of the motor vehicles".

It's noteworthy that some goods within this group, such as parts and accessories of the motor vehicles, Motor vehicles for the transport of goods and special-purpose motor vehicles, etc., are partly imported for further re-exporting.

The specific weight of manufactured goods classified by type of material decreased by 0.9 percentage points and amounted to 15.3 percent of the total volume of imported goods. Iron and steel have a major share within such group; their import decreased by 6.3 percent in the reporting period compared to the first quarter of 2014. Paper and paperboard as well as various paper and metal products, rubber tyres, textile fabrics and construction materials refer to significant products within this group. In the reporting period, there was observed a decrease in total value of the majority of mentioned products of this group.

**In terms of geographical distribution**, the share of the CIS countries increased for the reporting period (from 49.4 percent to 57.2 percent) correspondingly; while the share of the other countries made 42.8 percent. The share of goods import from the EEU countries increased from 44.5 percent to 52.7 percent. On the whole for the reporting period, goods were imported to the Kyrgyz Republic from 125 countries from around the world (in January to March 2014, the goods were imported from 113 countries).

The fuel and energy products traditionally made the basis of import. The main supplier of petroleum products was the Russian Federation; electricity and coal were supplied from Kazakhstan.

Main food products (cereals and their products, sugar, vegetable oils and other food products, etc.) were also mainly imported from the EEU countries.

Despite a significant decrease (64.1 percent) in the total value, the "motor cars" group had a main share in the commodity structure of import from foreign countries. The share of non-CIS countries (mainly Japan, Germany, China and Korea) accounted for more than 57.0 per cent of the total import of this commodity group. The structure of goods imported from non-CIS countries showed an increase in supplies of medicaments against a decrease in import of articles of apparels and clothing accessories as well as meat and meat preparations.

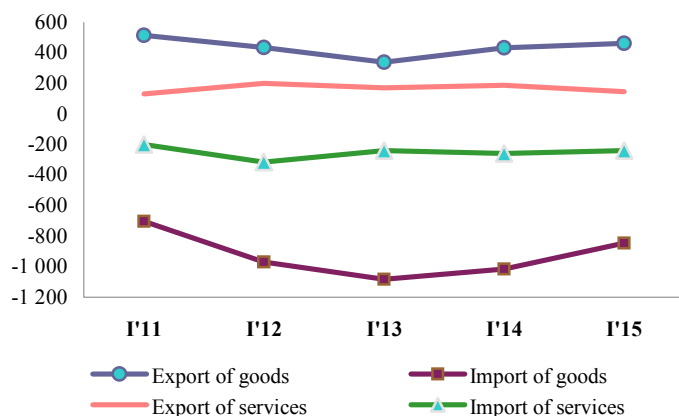

## BALANCE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

Along with a decrease in the foreign trade activity of the Kyrgyz Republic, the volume of international services decreased as well.

**Chart 3. External service and goods trade\***

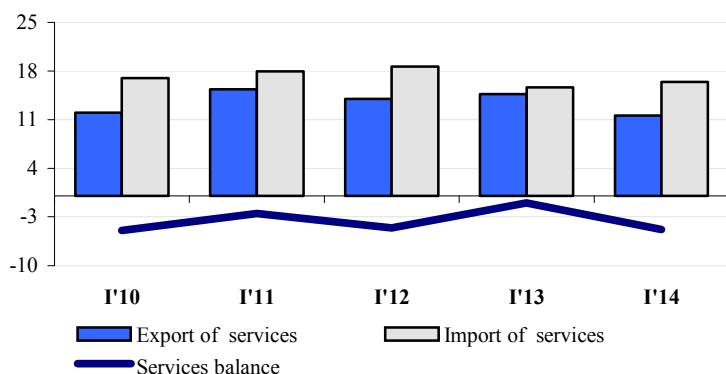

In the reporting quarter of the current year, the international services decreased by 13.9 percent to make USD 382.8 million.

**Imbalance of international services** increased by 30.0 percent against the comparable period of 2014 to make USD 95.8 million. Such rise of negative balance was conditioned by the 22.6 percent decrease in export of services against the 7.7 percent decrease in import of services.

In the reporting period, **export of services** reached USD 143.5 million, which corresponded to 31.1 percent of export of goods and 10.8 percent to GDP. **Import of services** amounted to USD 239.3 million to account for 28.3 percent of the import of goods and 18.1 percent to GDP.

In the reporting period, the main services traditionally included "transport services" and "travels and business services" that in total accounted for 85.9 percent of the international services.

The balance of transport services in the first quarter of 2015 decreased by 21.9 percent against the comparable figure of the first quarter of 2014 and amounted to USD 75.5 million. Such decrease was conditioned by the 15.7 percent decrease in the import (due to a decrease in railroad services) and

the 2.6 percent increase in export of transport services (due to transport services).

Negative balance of the "travels" item line changed slightly to make USD 12.5 million.

Net export of business services for the reporting period was formed with negative balance and amounted to USD 3.3 million against the positive value of USD 18.0 million in the first quarter of 2014. This resulted from a significant decrease in export of business services (by 63.3 percent), whereas their import remained virtually unchanged. The main factor that influenced the decrease in export of business services was the decrease in consulting services provided by residents of the Kyrgyz Republic.

## INCOME

Dynamics of the "incomes" item line was defined mainly by a change in the volume of income on direct investments due and payable by non-residents.

In January to March 2015, the balance of the "income" item was negative to make USD 100.0 million, which was 5.3 percent lower compared to the first three months of 2014. This trend was mainly due to a decrease in income of foreign direct investors as a result of the USD 12.8 million decrease in the volume of distributed dividend yield. The volume of reinvested profits of enterprises increased by 10.1 percent and made USD 76.5 million.

In the reporting period, the volume of interest payments on previously obtained credits increased slightly due to the growth in payments on credits to the public sector up to USD 12.4 million. At the same time, there was a decrease in the volume of other income gained by the country's residents from other investments down to USD 2.8 million. This contributed to the 17.9 percent (up to USD 16.4 million) increase in the deficit of the "incomes on other investments" item.

In the first quarter of 2015, the balance of the "**remuneration**" item line was negative as well and amounted to USD 5.0 million (15.0 percent increase), which was conditioned by a decrease in the total volume of non-residents' income gained from labor activity in the Kyrgyz Republic.

## TRANSFERS

The decreasing trend of the volume of received funds continued in the "current transfers" item conditioned by a decrease in the inflow of money remittances from labor migrants.

In the first quarter of 2015, positive balance of **current transfers** amounted to USD 226.8 million (17.1 percent to GDP), which was by 42.3 percent lower against the comparable period of the previous year.

**Private transfers** had a controlling influence on the account of current transfers; their net inflow decreased by 37.4 percent to make USD 227.8 million.

Mentioned decrease was caused by a decrease in the inflow of remittances of labor migrants; the specific weight of such remittances accounted for 96.2 percent in the overall volume of private transfers' inflow. The 31.7 percent decrease in gross inflow of remittances caused a decrease in the net volume of received transfers down to USD 219.1 million, which was 37.4 percent lower compared to the figure of the first quarter of 2014.

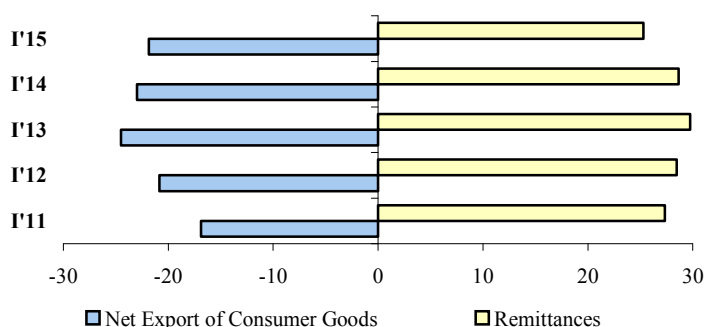

The main way of making labor migrants' money transfers to the country is via the money transfer systems<sup>11</sup>.

For the reporting period, net inflow of funds transferred via the money transfer systems decreased by 37.3 percent and amounted to USD 199.2 million<sup>12</sup>; while geographical structure of money transfers remained unchanged virtually. In the reporting quarter of current year, the main share of money transfers was from the Russian Federations (94.3 percent); while the share of other countries is considerably lower: 2.4 percent was received from Kazakhstan, and 1.9 percent was received from the USA. In terms of money transfers made from the Kyrgyz Republic, the prevailing share fell on

the Russian Federation (94.9 percent) as well.

In the reporting quarter of 2015, the balance of current transfers made to the **sector of state governance** (a neutral presentation of the balance of payments) was negative to make USD 1.0 million, while in the first quarter of the last year, the balance of official transfers was positive and amounted to USD 29.2 million.

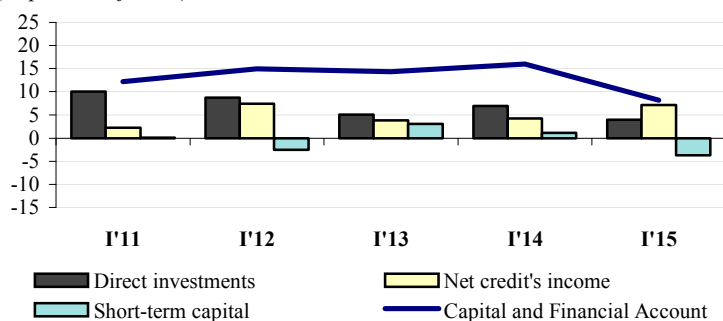
## CAPITAL ACCOUNT AND FINANCIAL ACCOUNT

*In the first quarter of 2015 there was a deficit of the capital and financial operations account. The "other investments" and "direct investment" items had a key role in formation of the deficit.*

In the first quarter of 2014 the **capital and financial transactions account** was formed with negative balance of USD 63.4 million.

The balance of **capital transactions account** was positive to make USD 9.6 million, which was 30.6 percent lower compared to the level observed in the first quarter of 2014. The decrease in the inflow of funds on the capital transactions account was caused by a decrease in capital transfers made as commodity grants.

In the first quarter of 2015, the **financial account** had a negative balance of USD 73.0 million against a positive value observed in the first quarter of 2014 that

amounted to USD 180.1 million.

In January to March 2015 the **"other investments"** item developed with negative value of USD 126.4 million against positive value of USD 218.7 million in the first quarter of 2014. The dynamic of this item was mainly influenced by an increase in residents' assets abroad along with a decrease in liabilities to non-residents.

The liabilities decreased by USD 31.0 million in the reporting quarter. This dynamic was caused by the 71.3 percent decrease in income from foreign loans of public and private sector with the 10.7 percent increase in payments for servicing previously obtained credits.

The amount of accounts payable of the resident enterprises decreased by USD 17.7 million in the reporting period against the USD 139.9 million increase in the first quarter of 2014. The wholesale and retail enterprises as well as manufacturing, construction, and electric power and gas supply enterprises had the predominant share in the total accounts payable.

During the reporting period, the assets of residents increased by USD 95.4 million with basic increment ensured by the USD 48.2 million increase in assets of commercial banks owned abroad and the USD 44.9 million increase in accounts receivable by non-residents. As of the end of March 2015, in the aggregate, more than 68.0 percent of the gross accounts receivable related to the manufacturing industries, electric power and gas supply enterprises as well as institutions engaged in wholesale and retail trade.

Balance on the "**direct investment**" item line was positive in the reporting period and amounted to USD 39.8 million, whereas in the first quarter of 2014 it had negative value to make USD 38.7 million. The increase in direct investment is mainly conditioned by inflow of funds to the capital stock and increase in the reinvested income.

In the reporting period, in terms of economic activity, the greatest net inflow of direct investment was observed in the sphere of manufacturing, financial intermediation and insurance as well as in the wholesale and retail trade enterprises and those dealing with repair of motor vehicles and motorcycles.

In the first quarter of 2015, the **overall balance of payments** was negative to make USD 137.0 million.

Balance of the "**errors and omissions**" item line was negative and amounted to USD 280.7 million, which indicated incomplete statistical accounting of transactions related to capital inflow into the country or export of goods and services. Taking into account the National Bank's additional estimates, the balance of "errors and omissions" item line was positive and amounted to USD 104.2 million.

The volume of gross international reserves amounted to USD 1,748.5 million late in March 2015, which covered 3.6 months of future import of goods and services.

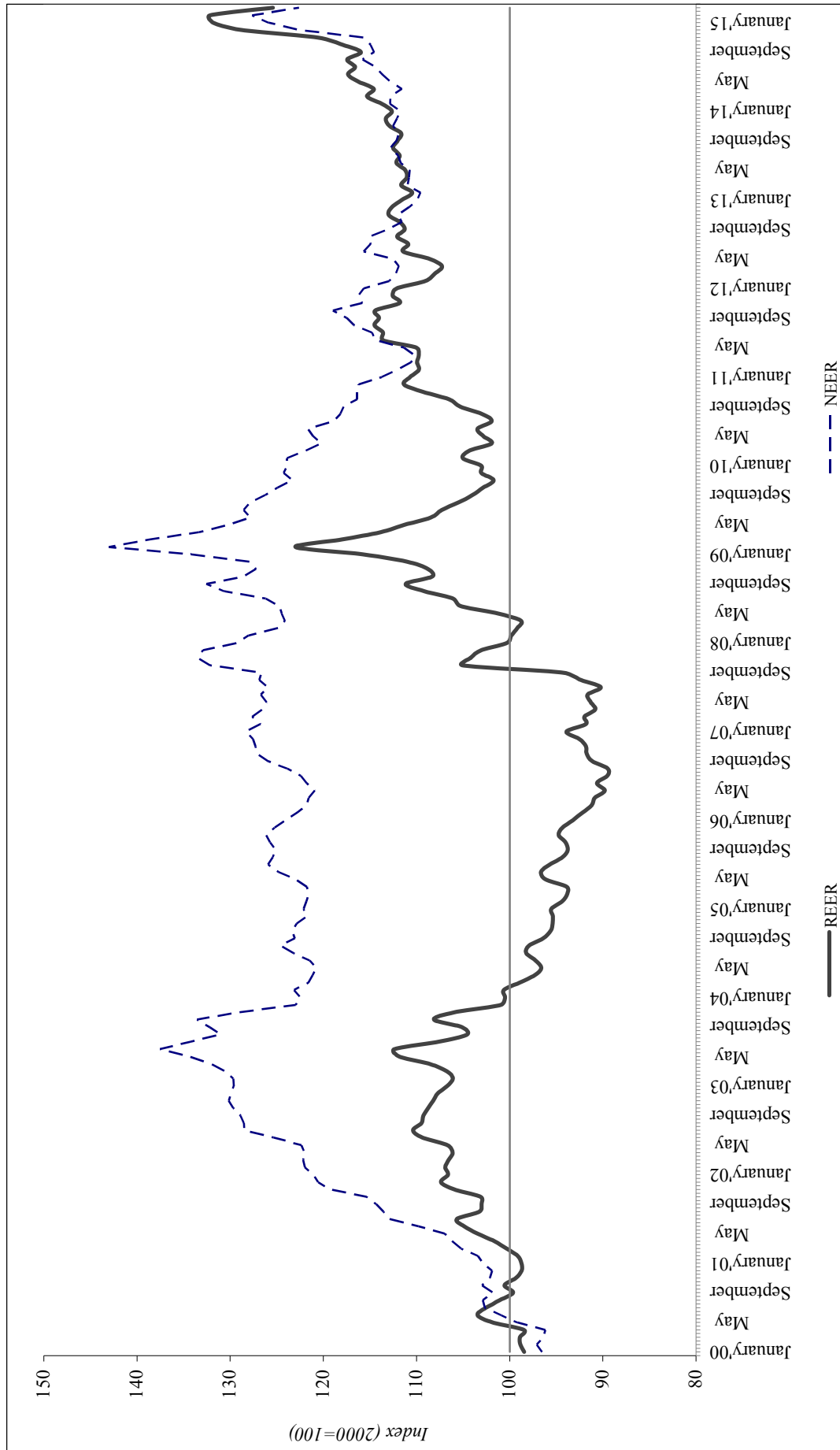
