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### ***Balance of Payments of the Kyrgyz Republic***

"Balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic" is issued by the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic. The legislative basis for the balance of payments are the Law of the Kyrgyz Republic as of July 29, 1997 No. 59 "On the National Bank of the Kyrgyz Republic" and the Resolution of the Government of the Kyrgyz Republic as of November 3, 2000 No. 645 "On measures to improve statistics of the balance of payments of the Kyrgyz Republic". This document reflects last tendencies in external sector development and shows statistical data on the balance of payments, external trade, international reserves, external debt and international investment position, as well as construction methods of balance of payments and informational database. This document is published 4 times a year - in January, May, July and October and has 3 language versions: Kyrgyz, Russian and English.

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
## THE CURRENT STATUS OF THE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

Following the results of the first half of 2012, the overall **balance of payments** formed positive in the amount of USD 86.5 million.

In the reporting period, the increased negative balance of goods and services has led to an increase in the **current account** deficit up to USD 712.6 million (15.7 percent to GDP). The current account deficit was financed by capital inflows on the **capital account and the financial operations** in the amount of USD 409.3 million.


**Chart 1: Current account**

### TRADE BALANCE<sup>1</sup>

The **trade balance** of the Kyrgyz Republic has traditionally formed with a negative balance, and, following the results of the first half of 2012, amounted to USD 1,242.0 million, which is in 2.1 times more than in the comparable period of 2011 and by 39.0 percent higher than the previous record high achieved in the first half of 2008.

The main reasons for the deterioration in the trade balance are the following factors:

- a) decline in export of gold;
- b) growth of the imports of petroleum products.

The **external trade turnover** in FOB prices in the reporting period increased by 15.4 percent compared with the first half of 2011 and amounted to USD 3,051.8 million in terms of value.

**Export of goods** in FOB prices (with additional estimates of NSC and the National Bank) was formed in the amount of USD 904.9 million, having decreased by 11.7 percent compared to the same indicator of the first half of 2011, when the historical

The main factor in the decline in exports was reduction of **gold** supplies, occupying 28.3 percent of the total volume of exported goods in the reporting period (by 58.2 percent). The reason for the fall was the decline in gold production at the Kumtor deposit by 66.4 percent<sup>2</sup> due to technical complications (increased movement of ice and waste rock in the southeastern part of the pit). At the same time, the trend of the falling value amount of export was slightly flattened owing to the increase in world gold prices by 15.1 percent<sup>3</sup>.

**Exports, excluding gold**, having fallen in the first half of 2009, exceeded the pre-crisis period in the first half of the current year and reached USD 693.9 million. It is by 33.3 percent more than the same figure in 2011 and by 15.2 percent higher than the level of the corresponding period in 2008. In the first half of 2012, the dominant part of the increase (73.0 percent) of exports, excluding gold, was obtained due to the increase in the value of:

- other inorganic materials by USD 58.2 million (due to increase in the average export price);
- vehicles for transport of goods by 17.8 million USD, ores and concentrates of precious metals by USD 15.6 million, jet kerosene (export of aircraft reserves) to USD 13.6 million, cotton by USD 11.0 million, fruit and nuts by USD 10.2 million (due to increased physical volume of supplies).

The above items, along with clothing and clothing accessories, vegetables, electric power, and dairy products, were the largest 10 products, which accounted for more than 60.0 percent of exports, excluding gold. Along with gold, above goods held 73.6 percent of the total exports in the reporting period.

Most of the country's exports is **manufactured products** (metallurgical, textile and clothing industry, the production of electrical equipment), agriculture and power generation.

The decline in **steel production** by 62.5 percent<sup>4</sup> affected the decline in gold exports. The peak supply of gold for the same periods of the last 5 years was in the first half of 2011 (USD 504.2 million), against which the fall in supply in terms of value to USD 211.0 million in the reporting period was significant. The physical volume of exports of the specified position fell by 64.2 percent, while the average export prices rose by 16.7 percent.

There was an increase for other steel products exported in the reporting period: supplies of iron and steel increased in 2.3 times (or by USD 6.6 million), jewelry - in 9.8 times (or by USD 1.3 million), various base metals - by 29.3 percent (or USD 0.9 million).

The tightening of the rules of import of goods into the territory of the Customs Union countries determined the decline in production<sup>5</sup> and export of certain products of **textile and garment industry**. In particular, there was reduction in export of knitted or crocheted garments (by 28.2 percent or USD 3.3 million) and clothing and headgear, except those made of textile fabrics (by 45.9 percent or USD 0.2 million).

In the reporting period, the average export prices for almost all types of garments decreased. Despite all of the above factors, export of other goods of garment production, including the largest group (garments of textile fabrics for women and girls), increased, as a result of which the growth rates for these group of goods "apparel and clothing accessories" article in comparison with the same periods of the last three years have slowed (increase by 7.7 percent compared to 16.6 percent in 2011).

Adverse climatic conditions in the first half of 2012 caused a slowdown in growth in **agricultural exports**.

In the reporting period, compared with the first half of 2011, despite the increase in the average export prices, the export of vegetables decreased by 15.7 percent or USD 8.0 million, tobacco - by 23.4 percent or USD 1.3 million, whole bovine skin leather - by 26.8 percent or USD 0.4 million. At the same time, there was an increase in the supply of fruit and nuts to 86.9 percent or USD 10.2 million, cotton - in 3.0 times, or by USD 11.0 million, live animals - by 5.5 percent or USD 0.2 million.

In the first half of this year, about 15.0 percent of exports was recorded **re-exports**, which mainly consists of a variety of machinery and equipment, consumer goods and other products.

**In the geographical structure** of export, the growth in the export of other inorganic substances affected the fact that Kazakhstan has become a major trading partner of the Kyrgyz Republic, occupying 29.9 percent of the total exports. The decline in exports of gold led to a relative decline in the share of Switzerland from 40.2 to 28.4 percent. Despite the decline in the cost amount of export to Russia by 11.6 percent, its share has remained relatively stable (16.1 percent versus 14.8 percent in the same period last year). In general, during the reporting period, the Kyrgyz Republic has exported products to 74 countries of the world (in 2008 - 60 countries).

The geographical distribution of the exported goods indicates that, except for gold, the CIS countries are the main markets for domestic goods. High geographic concentration is evident in almost all commodities and commodity groups, primarily on other inorganic substances, vehicles for transportation of goods and dairy products, more than 95.0 percent of the supply of which is carried out to one country. The consequence may be the dependence of exports of the Kyrgyz Republic on the economic and trade policies of individual countries.

**Import of goods** in FOB prices in the first half of 2012 increased by 32.6 percent and amounted to USD 2,146.9 million, reaching maximum historical value.

Dependence of the country on import of a wide range of goods, in the first place, on the group of energy and food products, leads to the sensitivity of the external trade of the world market. During the first 5 months of 2012, world prices on food markets remained stable. Thus, the average world prices of wheat fell by 18.2 percent due to high yields in 2011 in the countries which are the leading producers of cereals, including in Kazakhstan, a major supplier of grain to the Kyrgyz Republic. World prices for oil and sugar also fell. Despite the abolition of export duties on fuels and lubricants from Russia to Kyrgyzstan, the trend of rising oil prices (growth by 14.4 percent<sup>6</sup>) in complete dependence of the country on oil had significant impact on the cost volumes of import.

Import growth in the reporting period was mainly due to the increase in the supply of **petroleum products** by 44.5 percent (or USD 140.4 million). This increase was primarily due to increase in the physical volume of import by 31.1 percent compared with the first half of 2011, mainly due to the possibility of tax-free import of fuels and lubricants from Russia. In this case, the actual average contract prices for petroleum products imported in Kyrgyzstan increased by 10.2 percent.

Gasoline and diesel fuel accounted for more than 80.0 percent of petroleum products imported into the country. The same goods were provided most of the increase in the cost of oil products in the reporting period: the supply of gasoline increased by 68.8 percent or USD 93.0 million in absolute terms, diesel fuel - by 52.3 percent or by USD 54.3 million. For the rest of the petroleum products, there has been a declining cost amount of imports by 8.9 percent. The change in the cost amount of the imports of all kinds of petroleum products was due to fluctuations in the physical volume of imports.

In the first half of 2012, machinery and transport equipment took the largest share **in the commodity structure** of import - 25.6 percent, which is by 4.3 percent more than in the first half of 2011. In this group, the leading position is occupied by used cars, the supply of which increased in 2.3 times (growth by physical volume) in the reporting year. Some goods in this group are imported for re-export: cars for transportation of goods, parts and accessories for motor vehicles, etc.

The share of the second largest group of imported goods - mineral fuels - increased from 21.7 to 22.8 percent due to increased supply of petroleum products, occupying 85.9 percent of this group. In addition to fuels and lubricants, a significant share in this group is occupied by natural gas, the supply of which grew by 28.2 percent, and coal, which import volumes declined by 10.7 percent.

The share of manufactured goods classified by material type did not change significantly and amounted to 15.3 percent. More than one-third of this group is occupied by iron and steel, as well as rubber tires, imported mainly for re-export to third countries.

The need to provide the country with grain products, flour and its products from imports explains the predominance of specified goods in the amount of food imported into the first half of 2012 (the group occupies 11.2 percent of imports). Also, the amounts of import of coffee, tea, cocoa and their products, meat and meat products, and sugar, the total share of which reached a maximum for the same period in the last five years and constituted 42.6 percent, are also significant.

Medicines, as one of the largest group of imported goods in the aggregate, hold 26.1 percent of the volume in the "chemicals and related products" group. In this group, the share of fertilizers, which peaked in a series of comparable data for the last five years, is rapidly growing, having reached 15.0 percent (3.9 percent in the first half of 2008).

Weight of other product groups, despite the rise in the cost amount, declined, and in the aggregate, amounted to 14.0 percent of total imports.

The **geographical distribution** of imports in the first half of 2012 remained the same. The country's dependence on energy carriers, consumer goods and some types of raw materials is the reason the following countries hold the dominant share in import: Russia (33.8 percent), China (19.5 percent) and Kazakhstan (10.2 percent), from where products are mainly imported.

Import of basic foodstuffs was mainly from the CIS countries. 65.0 percent of import of food and 84.0 percent of beverages and tobacco were received from Russia, Kazakhstan and Ukraine. The largest groups of imported food products, such as cereals and their products, coffee, tea, sugar and other food products are imported from these countries. In the structure of imported non-food consumer goods (clothing and footwear), the dominant share is occupied by China and Turkey, which together account for 95.0 and 86.4 percent of total imports, respectively.

Due to the possibility of duty-free imports of fuels and lubricants from the Russian Federation and Kazakhstan introducing a temporary ban on the export of light petroleum products before the end of 2012, in the reporting period, 96.6 percent of petroleum products were imported from Russia, and the share of Kazakhstan has reached its minimum for the comparable period in the last 5 years (1.6 percent).

There is also a noticeable shift in the import of cars. If in the first half of 2008 the dominant share was occupied by Germany (39.8 percent), in the reporting period, the share of Japan constituted 29.1 percent of the total imports of cars.



## BALANCE OF INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

The increased volume of foreign trade of the Kyrgyz Republic was supported by an increase in turnover of international services, which in the first half of 2012 increased by 34.8 percent, reaching a level of USD 1,244.7 million.


**Chart 3: External service and goods trade**

import of services related to travel (by 63.6 percent), and on the services provided to foreign nationals during their stay on the territory of the Kyrgyz Republic (by 45.1 percent). In the dynamics of recent years, the largest decline in the services related to travel was in the first half of 2010, however, the previous volumes of turnover have been restored and are still growing.

The negative balance of USD 194.4 million, formed on the transport services, was the result of a significant increase in imports of services in this article on the background of a slight increase in export (31.5 and 3.9 percent, respectively). In the dynamics of transportation services for the corresponding periods of last 5 years, a decline that occurred in 2009-2010 was overcome in the first half of 2011 and continued growing in the reporting period.

Net export of business services, which in the same periods of the last three years, had a positive value, in the reporting period, was observed with a negative value in the amount of USD 33.7 million. The main factor was the surge in import of business services in the first half of 2012 (by 89.7 percent), while exports of services as compared to the base period remained virtually unchanged (an increase by 2.5 percent).

**Deficit of the balance of international services** (neutral presentation of the balance of payments) constituted USD 181.7 million, having increased in 4.0 times compared to the same period in 2011 and reached a maximum in a series of similar data for the last 5 years. The outpacing import of services (by 47.3 percent) compared with the increase of their export (by 21.0 percent) also contributed to this.

In the reporting period, **export of services** reached USD 531.5 million, which corresponds 58.7 percent of export of goods. **Import of services** amounted to 33.2 percent of import of goods and formed in the amount of USD 713.2 million.

In the first half of 2012, the largest articles, accounting for more than 90.0 percent of the total turnover of international services, were travel, transport and business services.

The balance of the "travel" article traditionally formed with a surplus, which in the first half of this year fell by 27.0 percent reaching USD 30.4 million. Dynamic growth was observed both on

**In the geographical structure** of services CIS countries occupy a major share: 66.8 percent of exports and 63.4 percent of imports. It should be noted the significant growth in the share of CIS countries in the export of services as compared to the same period in 2011, primarily due to growth in services related to travel. Thus, the volume of services provided to citizens of Kazakhstan during their stay in the territory of the Kyrgyz Republic, in the reporting period increased in 2.2 times.

The main partners of foreign countries are the United States and Switzerland.

## INCOME

In the first half of 2012, the negative balance of income amounted to USD 128.6 million, which is by 55.8 percent less than in the first six months of 2011.

This trend is mainly due to the reduction of income of foreign direct investors from investing activities in Kyrgyzstan, which is reflected in the decline of reinvested profit of enterprises from USD 264.1 to 89.6 million. As a result, balance of income on direct investment declined from USD 267.0 million in the first half of 2011 to USD 109.3 million in the reporting period.

In January-June 2012, there was an increase in interest payments on loans received by commercial banks for USD 2.7 million, and other income of residents also increased by USD 1.8 million, all of which had an impact on the reduction of the negative balance of other investments to USD 4.8 million (USD 3.7 million).

## TRANSFERS

The positive balance of **current transfers** following the results of the first half of 2012 reached another high, constituting USD 839.8 million, which is by 4.9 percent more than in the first half of 2011 and by 44.7 percent more than the corresponding period of 2009, which registered the highest decline in net inflows of current transfers for the comparable periods of the last 5 years.


**Private transfers** (neutral presentation of the BOP), whose net inflow amounted to USD 838.8 million, which is by 9.8 percent more than in the base period, play a determining role in the current transfers account.

This increase was traditionally achieved by remittances of workers, which occupy 98.6 percent of the total private transfers received. Transfers under this article, for the first time surpassing the pre-crisis level in 2011, continued to grow during the reporting period: the total inflow of remittances amounted to USD 943.6 million, having increased by 17.3 percent compared with the first half of 2011. However, note the slowing of remittances due to the significant decline in external migration of the population<sup>7</sup>, noted during the first half of 2012, one of the causes of which was the denunciation of the Russian-Kyrgyz agreement on the facilitation of the citizenship of the Russian Federation by the citizens of the Kyrgyz Republic in March 2012.

by Russia (97.0 percent).

Remittances are the main source of financing of the trade deficit. The balance of remittances still covers net export of consumer goods, which in turn formed with a negative value of USD 594.2 million.

In the reporting period, a net inflow of current transfers to the **public sector** (neutral presentation of balance of payments) was positive in the amount of USD 0.9 million, having decreased by 97.4 percent compared to the corresponding figure in 2011 and hitting a low for the comparable periods of last 5 years. The main reason for this decline was a decrease of 93.2 percent of cash grants received by the public sector.


The main channel for remittances to the country is the systems of transfers<sup>8</sup> (91.4 per cent of gross inflows). In the reporting period, a net inflow of money transfer systems as compared to the previous year increased by 15.3 percent, exceeding USD 750 million<sup>9</sup>. At the same time, the geographical structure of remittances remains unchanged. Following the results of the first half of this year, the bulk of remittances came from Russia (95.9 percent), Kazakhstan (1.9 percent) and the U.S.A.(1.6 percent). In the structure of remittances, sent from the Kyrgyz Republic, the dominant share is also held

## CAPITAL ACCOUNT AND FINANCIAL ACCOUNT

Following the results of the first half of 2012, the balance of the capital account and financial account (analytical presentation of balance of payments) was formed with a positive balance in the amount of USD 409.3 million, which is a historical peak for the corresponding periods of last 5 years.

Capital account in the reporting half formed with a surplus of USD 8.4 million, versus a negative value of USD 25.1 million for the corresponding period of 2011.

The change in this article was mainly influenced by operations related to capital flow of migrants who have left to live permanently in foreign countries. In the reporting period, there is a significant decrease of assets exported by migrants: USD 6.4 million versus USD 50.5 million in the same period last year.

following the results of the reporting period increased from USD 210.4 to 400.9 million, mainly due to active borrowing of loan capital.

Net inflow of direct investment fell by 38.6 percent to USD 202.5 million. In the structure of foreign direct investment, the main decrease accounted for reinvested earnings, the amount of which decreased to USD 89.6 million (by USD 174.5 million). In the geographical structure of foreign direct investment, there is a decrease in inflows, mainly from foreign countries, in particular, from Canada and China. The most attractive economic activities in terms of foreign direct investment are the financial sector, operation with real estate, rent and rendering of services to consumers and trade. Along with this, foreign direct investment in the manufacturing sector decreased by USD 198.9 million compared to the first half of 2011.

The balance of the "portfolio investments" article for the period under review did not change significantly, and the negative balance decreased by 9.9 percent to USD 130.3 million.

The balance of the "other investments" article in the first half of this year was positive constituting USD 330.3 million against USD 25.1 million in the same period of 2011. Formation of this article was due to the raising of capital of residents for USD 188.3 million, the bulk of which consists of a cash flow of enterprises in foreign banks for USD 212.1 million.

The external liabilities of the country formed in the amount of USD 142.0 million, which is by 33.5 percent more than the same period of the first half of 2011. Increase in liabilities was due to the influence of a small increase in raised loans, which amounted to USD 105.4 million (in the first half of 2011 it constituted 94.8 million USD). The bulk of loans was received by the public sector - USD 65.4 million, the private sector has raised a loan capital for USD 40.0 million.

Accounts payable of enterprises to non-residents increased from USD 2.5 to 32.5 million.

The "errors and omissions" article was positive in the amount of USD 389.7 million, which indicates incomplete statistical coverage of export of goods and services or capital inflows to the country.

Gross international reserves at the end of June 2012 amounted to USD 1,915.3 million, which covers 3.8 months of future import of goods and services.


